'There are Easter Eggs in the shops; it must be Easter then!'

Going into my local supermarket at the beginning of January I couldn't help but notice that the Christmas goods were being sold at a discount, and that there were Easter Eggs on the shelves; so it must Easter! Not really, as we know.

As with most Festivals of the Church the secular world not only misuses them, but misunderstands them as well. For most people in our country the Festivals have become associated with an abundance of chocolate things, and not with what we are actually celebrating, how the Love of God the Father in Christ Jesus His Son conquers all in the power of the Holy Spirit.


Two images should be in our minds and hearts at Easter: the Cross and the Empty Tomb. Jesus could not walk out of the Tomb on the first Easter Day unless He had been killed on Good Friday. And He was killed in the most horrible way, for the Romans had devised Crucifixion to degrade, to humiliate, to punish and eventually kill the Victim. This is the part of the Easter Mystery that Easter Bunnies, Easter Eggs and fluffy little chicks never acknowledges. We have an uphill task at Easter. Most people seem to acknowledge that Jesus was a good man, even that He died, but when we start to talk about Him not staying dead but rather Him being Resurrected, for non-Christians, problems arise. So what should we do?

It has been suggested that if we would just drop the resurrection bit, and concentrate instead on the wonderful teaching of Jesus and His example of generosity, compassion and love then everybody would find Christianity much more believable. Wouldn't that make more sense for us? And wouldn't

that fill the churches again? Well it might (or, more likely, it might not). Yet the trouble would then be that this simply wouldn't be Christianity at all!

The faith of all Christians actually depends on the Resurrection from the dead of Jesus, and always has done, right from the first Easter Day when the Risen Lord Jesus greeted Mary Magdalene in the Garden. After the crucifixion the body of Jesus was taken down from the cross by some of His friends and put in a rock tomb closed with a heavy stone. Yet, when the women came to anoint His dead body on the third day after His death, His tomb was found to be empty; and there is more. He was seen by His followers alive, not a ghost, not a zombie, but a REAL LIVING MAN; they met Him, saw Him, talked with Him, touched Him, ate with Him. So certain was their belief that nothing could make them recant it. Not ridicule, nor torture, nor even death itself. They couldn't do it because they were absolutely convinced that it had happened. Plenty of clever and powerful people at the time of the Resurrection had a

vested interest in proving the disciples wrong. It shouldn't have been difficult to prove that a dead man had stayed dead, especially when you have at your disposal the resources of the greatest empire at that time in history. Yet they didn't do it, because it couldn't be done.

Today billions of people around the world believe and respect the witness of those first disciples of Jesus: Mary Magdalene, John and Peter, the disciples on the road to Emmaus, Doubting Thomas who doubted no more, St. Paul on the Road to Damascus. These apostles and disciples saw the Risen Lord Jesus and knew Him to be alive. So today men and women of all ages believe that Jesus is Risen from the dead, and because of this faith their own lives have been transformed by a relationship with Jesus - a relationship that wouldn't make sense if He were dead!

Ultimately, we Christians don't put our faith in a dead hero from the past, but in someone who is alive and active in our own lives and in the world. And that, put simply is the message that we proclaim: Jesus is Risen from the dead and is alive and active in our lives, in our world, in our Church.

Resurrection All Saint's Lincoln

When I was instituted as Vicar of All Saints, Lincoln I and the Parish knew at the outset that because of my advanced age it would only be five years! For there to be a Resurrection there has to have been a death- but All Saints, close to Lincoln City Centre wasn't dead as such. At times there were single figure numbers only attending the Sunday Mass and there had been plans to demolish the church and build flats, but a handful of key individuals had remained absolutely resolute in trying to maintain the catholic tradition that the Church had been established with in 1904. For twenty years after 1993 priests were appointed who were happy "to preserve the style of worship" but not to promote the Faith the worship is all about. Resolutions A & B passed in 1993 were rescinded by the casting vote of one Vicar although no female priests were ever used to celebrate Mass. Within Forward in Faith in Lincolnshire there was a feeling of sadness and

were starting tp move- Covid struck and our new Deacon's ordination was postponed to October. In fact Covid had its silver linings. We were united in resolving to do as much as we could from the earliest moment and like other of our churches we picked up worshippers who found their church closed and remained closed for months longer than necessary.

Resurrection is of course about a Rising Again and New Life. So how has it been shown? It shouldn't be all about numbers- but firstly, yes numbers have grown. From under 20 on a very good Sunday Morning to usually 40 and often near to 50. In addition twice monthly Solemn Evensong & Benediction which means even more Sunday worshippers. The age profile is nowhere near as high as most parishes in this Diocese and moreover is about 50% male 50% female- as it should be.



to an excellent organist. We also last year had one, and this year two, funded full time Parish Interns/Pastoral Assistants discerning a vocation to the priesthood. Among other things they run weekly bible studies with free food for students! Not everything has worked- we've not cracked Children's Work and outreach to the wider community has not taken off as it should. But has there been a real resurrection in Lincoln.



resignation that what had once been the flagship Anglo-Catholic Church in the City would inevitably be lost completely.

So what changed? Firstly after the settlement of Women Bishops, a practical outworking of that tag of "Mutual Flourishing". So that in this spirit, the then Diocesan Bishop, Archdeacon and Rural Dean were united in determining that if All Saints was to have any future, the only logical one was as a Traditional Anglo-Catholic Church for the City. It was put to Richborough Clergy in Lincolnshire that we should actually do an HTB-style Church Plant at All Saints! The Diocese had bought back the former 1950's Vicarage, (sold because the previous Vicar didn't like the neighbourhood) in readiness for an appointment and Bishop Norman was asked for his assistance. It would mean finding a priest for a parish with a very high degree of social deprivation, a building which needed attention and only a small, albeit faithful, congregation. The search was a prolonged one and seemed fruitless. In the end I put forward my own name to Bishop Norman and Bishop Christopher and was duly appointed.

From the start I received the total support of the PCC and congregation. Maybe a realisation that is was this or slow death helped - but within a matter of months and with the willingness of all concerned, the creaky "temporary" platform and Nave Altar were removed and the High Altar restored to use, a fully catholic Mass Rite was adopted, the Resolution was passed and All Saints registered as first a Society and then a Forward in Faith Parish. Another boost from the Diocese was the promise of a Curate and Fr Ross Copley came forward and just as things

Mass is celebrated every day except Monday, similarly Morning and Evening Prayer. A trendy A frame chalkboard is outside whenever we are open so our local people know we're a living presence. There are two retired priests and one University Chaplain, who are wonderful, and faithful laity busy with work for the Church, including a fine team of about eight servers now- the majority in their 20's or 30's. There is a scheme of bursaried Choral Scholars and a Music Outreach Minister in addition

And what's been key? Before all things a request for people's prayers and a starting premise that good liturgy and good music were essentials for a church like this. So firstly then embracing our tradition in its rich fullness; younger people don't want to inhabit the church of the 1970's, 80's and 90's or even 00's! Secondly, using the skills, gifts and insights of the next generations; one priest nearing 70 whose skills and thinking belong to a past era would have been useless. Fr Ross as Curate was key in developing various strategies, with a youthful professionalism way beyond a priest approaching retirement, in particular the Parish Intern scheme with the recruitment of two Interns, as well as the Music Outreach Minister. Nothing has been as encouraging to new worshippers as the enthusiasm, dedication and faithful devotion of these young men. Thirdly the take-up of available grants: the Diocese of Lincoln's Transformation Fund enabled the Music Minister and Choral Scholars to be started- but grants from the Catholic Societies have been crucial. Funds made available by the Trustees of CBS, ACS, ACOCF, the Cleaver Fund and SSC Mission Direct have been invaluable. New life and new hope here are the fruits of Historic Tradition, Youthful zeal and Investment from our own Anglo-Catholic Charities.



Resurrection St Luke's Gillingham

As an 'angelic choir boy' of Rochester Cathedral, Bishop Martin of Chichester made a visit to St Luke's – and THANKS to that visit, he says he 'caught' the Catholic Faith! When the Bishop came to preach at our Church for the St Luke's Sunday in October 2020, he said in his sermon that St Luke's was a 'CHRISTIAN LIGHT IN THE BACKSTREETS OF GILLINGHAM'. These words sum up our ministry at St Luke's.

Yes, we are in the area where many of the Dock workers lived, or families had members in the armed forces. In 1984, the Royal Navy Docks at Chatham closed, and that closure also affected the civic docks in the Gillingham area. Instead of a 'pub on every corner'- we now have only one in the parish – and a social club!

What has replaced the docks, multi storey flats galore and student flats (there are outposts of 3 local universities in the neighbouring parish in ex naval buildings) with all the difficulties of trying to reach the people in those flats – but we try! There were 3 students from the Student flats in Church on Sunday.

I arrived at the parish in March, 2019 – House for duty. The first thing I did was restore the Daily Mass. Having being trained at Chichester Theological College, yes, I am a 'Daily Mass' priest. I am very THANKFUL that often we have 3 or 4 people at that, with its daily Bible readings/prayer and Sacrament.

I stand facing a window showing 'Our Lady of the Banana'- yes a wicked school boy, now a priest in Australia- decided the moon she stands on looks more like a banana!. WELL, that is GOOD, bananas are a very nutritious fruit, and Holy Mary is certainly nourishing us at St Luke's in all sorts of ways. She has certainly nourishes my ministry!

There are strong links with Walsingham at St Luke's, a Walsingham Cell meets each month and people from other churches come to this. Also, we have a parish pilgrimage once a year, it has been wonderful to inherit that. Last June saw St Luke's having a 'Fan the Flame Mission'. God DID use that in a wonderful way, the Medway Town had had an awful week when there had been 7 stabbings, luckily none fatal. Our Missioners, Sr Carol from Walsingham and Fr Norman Taylor from Sussex were sitting in a local café having 'a cup of tea' (NOT a G & T!), and the manageress came up and spoke to them. Her son had been one of those stabbed, they were able to listen, help and pray for her AND the son. THANKS BE TO GOD.

One of the congregation gave me a phrase-'TEAM ST LUKE'S. Yes, here we are, 25 at Parish Mass on Sunday mornings- praying/ working though Community Café & Jumble Sales / Youth Group/ Singing Group/ sheltered accommodation visiting/ local primary school assembly and other ways keeping 'The Rumour of God alive' in the Parish and local area. So much seems against us – but we keep 'praying, smiling and marching on for our Lord and Our Lady' so still letting St Luke's be that CHRISTIAN LIGHT in the backstreets of Gillingham! PRAY FOR US, please, as we keep doing this.

Resurrection Hope at St Chad's

After the previous gas boiler was condemned in April 2021, we needed to install a new heating system that would satisfy the Church of England's green credentials.

We set up an action group (two Church Wardens and the Treasurer) and booked a consultation with Leeds company, LEDA, on the advice of Ulrike Knox who conducted our quinquennial inspection. We considered all the options presented on the ensuing environmental report and decided to look into the provision of radiant heaters. Herschel have been supplying these both to churches and companies for some time but PCCs were increasingly reluctant to install their bar heaters, especially in historic churches. In response to their concerns, Herschel developed their Halo design which we chose.

We began our own fundraising campaign and appealed for donations. Our efforts included an organ concert and selling unwanted items on eBay. We applied for grants from various charitable bodies and are extremely grateful for their support.

Electriko, the company responsible for the installation, was on standby to carry out the work as soon as the faculty was granted and the project was completed within a week. We are very pleased both with the heat from the halos and with their appearance which echoes the circular light fittings from 1915 (see photograph).

Until now a church in Bristol has been the 'pilot' church recommended for interested parties to visit. We too are now being contacted by churches whose PCCs are interested in having this system. We have organized two visits so far and Herschel arranged an open day in late February, with refreshments, so that representatives from multiple parishes could attend at the same time. Thankfully the heating is now installed, working and incredibly beneficial, not only in terms of keeping the regular congregation nice and warm, but in providing a fertile ground that will enable the Mission and Evangelism of this parish to flourish and grow. We are very grateful indeed for the combined work of all the charities that have assisted us in this work. Many would maintain that St Chad's is not only unique in this area and diocese for its presentation of the Catholic Faith in the Church of England, but

also in the beauty of its building. Churches like St Chad's are fundamental in our position in the Church of England and definitely needs to be protected.

Farewell to Bishop Norman

At Easter, we bid farewell to the Right Reverend Norman Banks who lays down his episcopal ministry (well, the stipendiary part at least!) after 13 years in post. And of course it is only right we should place on record the thanks and appreciation of our constituency to him for his time as the Southern Province's Episcopal Visitor in the See of Richborough.

It was on 31 December 2010 that Bishop Keith Newton resigned as the Bishop of Richborough, to be received into Communion with the Roman Catholic Church the next day. Just six months later Bishop Norman took up Richborough reins, with all its challenges at that time, as Keith's successor.



A proud Geordie by birth, Bishop Norman hails from Wallsend, Tyne and Wear. A bright lad, after Wallsend Grammar School he studied at Oriel College in Oxford, the city in which he later trained for the Priesthood at Saint Stephen's House. He began his ministry in 1982 back in Newcastle itself, moving from a First Curacy there to spend a decade as Parish Priest of Cullercoats in the centre of Whitley Bay, and then on to Walsingham for a further 11 years before his move to a house in the Close at Saint Alban's.

For Traditional Catholics in the Church of England, Bishop Norman was a welcome blast of fresh air and bonhomie in those difficult days following the exodus of all too many alongside the former bishops of Ebbsfleet, Fulham, and Richborough to the Ordinariate. Unfailingly cheerful, with great enthusiasm and energy he has melded a disparate (and perhaps disspirited) group of people, priests, and parishes into what is now very much the 'Richborough Family' gathered around its flamboyant and incredibly well-dressed bishop. It's probably true to say, surely, that Bishop Norman is the best-dressed bishop on the bench!

With the heart of an experienced parish priest, Bishop Norman has made resourcing the Laity of the Parishes and his Church Wardens a priority, often gathering them together over afternoon tea to support them and educate them in the byzantine ways of church politics. Already well-









known to many from his Walsingham days, he has got to know his clergy well, bringing them together, and exercising pastoral care creatively, using those long hours spent in the car to phone his priests in order to catch up with them and share in their joys and sorrows. And Bishop Norman's Richborough Festivals have become legendary – their pastor calling people together for good worship and shared food followed by Bible Study, often in his own garden.

As a former theological college inspector for the then Advisory Board for Ministry, Bishop Norman easily recognised deficiencies in the training of new clergy for our context, and with clarity of vision mapped out a route for the care and



education of his folk and the wider constituency from the very first enquiry of a prospective Candidate for Ministry to the third year following their Ordination, working with the Catholic Vocations Group on their regular programmes for fostering vocations, and creating the annual residential Integrated Ministerial Education programme at Walsingham for the newly ordained, as well as working hard behind the scenes to gain all the necessary funding for this.

In the wider Church, Bishop Norman has served as Chairman of the Guild of All Souls, venturing even to the States to preach at the Annual Requiem for the American Guild, and he has also sojourned to Sweden to lend support to the work of the (High-Church Lutheran) Society of Saint Bridget. And he has preached widely beyond the boundaries of his Richborough Episcopal Area, a welcome, well-liked and respected guest in many a parish.


Now, while this is of course a valediction to Bishop Norman, it would be completely remiss not to mention his amazing Chaplain, Guy. For Guy has not only been his driver to innumerable preaching engagements but has also so brilliantly (in a very unassuming way, and with dry humour) looked after his every need, even to the point of placing and whipping off zucchetto and mitre from his very head!

The very first Glastonbury Pilgrimage officially started on the 28th June 1924 when coaches principally from Bristol but also as far away as Salisbury converged to this Holy site. A newspaper report says that the procession from St John's to the Abbey comprised 30 priests, 400 vested and 1,500 lay people who were at the very first pilgrimage. A humble beginning which over the years gained more and more momentum and support not only from the laity but also the clergy, and indeed in the past many Diocesan Bishops were not only happy to attend but insisted that this event was placed firmly in their diaries. In 1988 an invitation was extended to the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Robert Runcie who accepted and famously arrived in the Abbey Grounds by a helicopter that was provided by Westlands. Communion figures were steadily increasing and were regularly in the region of 5,000 or more, with 100-120 coaches all bringing the faithful in from different corners of the land.

Numerically the pilgrimage may be somewhat smaller nowadays but there has always been a huge amount of excitement and fun drawing people together in this most Holy place and indeed for many on the Western side of the country and Wales, this remains the premier act of Catholic witness. The Pilgrimage Association are incredibly grateful to the Confraternity of the Blessed Sacrament who once again have generously provided funds that enable this event to take place. The programme for the weekend begins on Friday 12th July.







Father Gary Hartill and the people of St Chad's Coseley writes.

For over 30 years people at St Chads had to make do with an old sound system, which was second hand when installed. There was no such thing as a loop system and those with any form of impairment failed to fully participate. Several members of our church family are partially sighted so anything to enhance the sound is quite literally a God send. Through your kind generosity of £11,500 we now have microphones throughout the building, the speakers are not intrusive but have been strategically placed to optimize the sound quality and there is a loop system throughout the church to ensure everybody can fully participate in worship together. The weekend of the installation saw us host a "Proms in the Church" which many commented about the

clarity of the sound from the Wolverhampton Brass Band and the Wulfruna Ladies Choir. Please accept our thanks for such incredible generosity.

Here is but one of the reports we have received demonstrating the difference that St John's Guild are making to parishes in order to ensure worship is fully accessible.
